How We'll Win in 2017: Challenger David Reid



David Reid, a native Virginian and 17-year resident of Ashburn, is the Democratic candidate. He and his wife of 22 years sent their two daughters to Loudoun County public schools. Their eldest is now a junior at the UVA and their youngest is a sophomore at Lynchburg College. Reid served for 23 years in the US Navy Reserve as a Naval Intelligence Officer with two

deployments. He provided intelligence support to Operation Desert Shield and Operation Enduring Freedom and was awarded the distinguished Navy Commendation Medal on three occasions. Simultaneous with serving in the Navy Reserve, David has over 30 years of experience in strategic management, global telecommunications, banking, and the defense industry. He also volunteers as a soccer coach, soccer club team manager and national- and state-certified soccer referee in the Ashburn area.

David stated on deciding to run for office, "I've spent a great deal of time over the past year talking with people in the community about their concerns and frustrations with the 'business as usual' politics in Richmond." Reid added, "The people of Loudoun County are very 'results-oriented' and my experience in the Navy, in the community, and in business will provide them with innovative, bipartisan solutions to address the issues of transportation, education, college affordability, and public safety."

David holds a B.A. in Political Science from Northeastern Oklahoma State University and a Master's Diploma in Strategic Intelligence from the Joint Military Intelligence College.

Issues

Transportation: We need to implement common-sense "distance-based pricing" for the Dulles Greenway.

Education: It is unacceptable that Loudoun County remains one of the three counties in Virginia that does not provide full-day kindergarten to all our students.

Tax Fairness: I will fight in Richmond to secure our "fair share" of state funding.

Local Economy: I will focus on bringing more high-paying, quality jobs to Loudoun County.

Environment: Virginia can do its part in generating high-tech, renewable energy jobs.

About the Republican Incumbent: Thomas Greason

Thomas A. "Tag" Greason is a Republican member of the Virginia House of Delegates representing District 32. He is a graduate of the U.S. Military Academy at West Point and received an MBA with Honors from George Mason University. He is the Executive Vice President of Sales at Quality Technology Services (QTS), a real estate investment trust company. A strong fiscal conservative, Greason was first elected in 2010 and is currently serving his fourth term. He is a member of the influential Appropriations Committee, Education Committee and General Laws Committee in the House of Delegates.

Issues: Fiscally and socially conservative, Thomas A. "Tag" Greason represents this prosperous Northern Virginia district, which is commuting distance from DC -- not far west of Dulles Airport -- and home to the Washington Redskins practice facility. He has voted on the far right of social issues, particularly in four key areas:

1. In favor of voter suppression initiatives that adversely impact black and poor residents. *HB 2343, SB 872(HB 1428), SB 1256, SB 1*
2. Opposed gun safety measures and decreased gun safety by broadening the availability of guns through gun-carrying and concealed weapons laws. *SB 610, HB1096, HB766*
3. Against women's reproductive rights (anti-abortion and "shaming" laws). *HR268, HB2264*
4. Against expansion of Medicaid.

Recent Elections: In 2016, Hillary Clinton won this district by **57%!** In 2015, Greason won against Elizabeth Miller, 9,734 (53.1%) vs 8,596 (46.9%). Turnout for this election was very low (36%). His 2013 margin against Miller was even smaller, 51.3% vs 48.5% (only 651 votes).

Strengths: Greason has record in this district on supporting education, transportation, and economic growth. He has been elected four times and has strong support from this fiscally conservative community. He was a top scorer in Northern Virginia Chamber Partnership counts and he was voted Legislator of the Year by the Virginia Childcare Association. He is well entrenched in the political hierarchy and is a close ally to Virginia House Speaker Bill Howell.

Potential Weaknesses: According to the Washington Post, he is "a darling of the National Rifle Association." He has repeatedly supported gun rights and opposed common sense gun safety issues. In addition, he has opposed Medicaid expansion on multiple occasions. He has proposed and supported numerous bills aimed at voter suppression, which the governor (McAuliffe) has vetoed. Greason has proposed and supported multiple bills aimed at trying to limit a woman's right to choose, including voting to defund Planned Parenthood and voting on budget issues to ensure poor women cannot receive federal funding to cover the medical cost of long-acting removable contraceptives, like IUDs (HB1500, the budget bill). He has voted against bills intended to help the poor constituents of the state. This year he voted to take \$5 million in federal funds, which are designed to help poor people find jobs or schooling, and divert the money into a program to treat opioid addiction. This would reduce the state's own contribution to opioid treatment by 80% from the governor's original proposal (HB1500, the budget bill).



Geography & Environment

The district is in eastern Loudoun County, at the far edge of the tech corridor that has grown westward from Washington D.C. along the

Dulles Airport access road over the past 35 years. That growth spawned the growth of new suburbs like those in District 32, northwest of the airport. This was a conservative farming area a generation or more ago and has now become a fast-growing haven of people transplanted from elsewhere. Many of them work in the tech industry or government-related companies.

Citizenry

The residents of District 32 are primarily white adults of working age with relatively high incomes and high levels of education. The age of residents is strongly skewed to working age adults: 70% are adults between the age of 22 and 64; seniors over 65+ comprise only 7% of the population. The district is predominately white (62%), with the next highest ethnicity being Asians at 17.6%. Hispanics represent 8.7% and Blacks 7.2% of the population. District 32, with 84,812 people, is the third most populous district in Virginia, just behind District 40 and 35. Of the 28,865 households, 47% have families with children under the age of 18. Fifteen percent of the residents of Ashburn, the biggest city, are Asian; more than 9% speak Asian and Indic languages like Hindi, Chinese and Urdu. There are no mosques or Islamic community centers in the district. Loudoun County has more Catholics than other religions, but 61% of those reporting in 2010 professed no religion.

Education

The educational level of the residents aged 25 or older is high: 69.5% have degrees higher than high school level and 26.9% have a high school diploma. Only 3.6% (1,921 residents) have no high school diploma. It is notable, that among all districts in Virginia, District 32 is the third highest in private preschool enrollment; 84% of preschool children are enrolled in private schools. Big high schools are Broad Run (the Spartans, loads of sports teams), Stone Bridge and Briar Woods. Northern Virginia Community College has a Loudoun County campus.

Economy

The District has a strong economy, with many of the residents commuting to Washington D.C. to work in government jobs. There is also a strong and growing tech sector. The median income is \$125,100, with 6,139 households (21.3%) earning over \$200K. Only 780 households (2.7%) earn \$20K or less. Asian households have the highest median income at \$136,900 and non-Hispanic whites have a median income of \$130,400. Median incomes for Blacks and Hispanics are \$85,400 and \$70,300, respectively. Among the working age population of 60,690, 74% are employed, 3% are unemployed and 22.6% are not in the labor force. There are only 380 households on food stamps. District 32 is the lowest at 99/100 in Virginia, in terms of receipts of food stamps.

Health Status

Loudoun county has a low rate of poverty with only 3.6% of households under the FPL. Only 8.4% of residents are uninsured but the racial disparity plays a significant role in Northern Virginia. Pockets of poverty and racial disparities within Northern Virginia lead to worse health outcomes. The median age is 35.1 in the county. Diabetes, hypertension, and obesity were lower than the national benchmarks but showed racial disparity with higher incidence among Blacks in the county. Mental health rates are lower than national benchmarks but whites have higher suicide rates and there is a lack of adequate mental health providers in the area. 1,200 people in VA HD32 would gain Medicaid coverage if the Republicans stopped blocking the expansion of Medicaid.

Issues

Transportation remains an important issue within the district as increasing number of federal and high-tech commuters clog the surrounding beltway.
